This years ride is going to have a lot of riders as of Tuesday Sept 24th the MS had 1307 riders registered, they have 94 teams vs. last year at this time they had 86. This event just gets bigger and better each year. Looking ahead at the weather report for Carlsbad, it looks like it will be in the 70s and 80s. so we will need to watch for riders that didn't plan their water needs correctly.

What been happening lately with the committee? Well Kari that work at the MS office was able to convince the General at Camp Pendleton to permit the bicyclists to go through the base. If you will recall last year they closed the base to non-military bicycle riders the day after the MS went through the base. This will be the first large group of bikes on the base in a year so. the riders will have to be a little more caution as the cars on the base are not used to seeing a bunch of bicycles in the last year. Not only do you need to be trained to perform the procedure — you need to be retrained every two years. These classes generally cost anywhere from \$25 to \$35, and well worth it. But hold on to your money. HAVE WE GOT A DEAL FOR YOU!

The Garden Grove Adult Education Program is offering the CPR Course and the Basic Standard First Aid Course — For the unheard of fee of only \$19.

The all day classes are conducted only on Saturdays, and you must pre-register in person, presenting a picture ID, and paying for the class, at the Lincoln Center, 11262 Garden Grove Blvd. You may phone them at (714) 663-6291 for information about class availability — But they will not hold a position for you. You must pre-register. Spaces are limited — So don't procrastinate.

Upcoming class dates are: Oct 5, 12, 19, 26; Nov 2; Dec 7, 14;

Jan 11, 25; I'm sure that you can call the office for future dates — past what I have listed.

This CPR class will provide students with knowledge and skills necessary to recognize, and initiate treatment needed for airway obstructions, and respiratory arrest in adult, child and infants. Successful completion will provide the student with a CPR and Emergency Cardiac Provider Card — The Heartsavers Course, from the American Heart Association.

The Basic First Aid portion of the Course will provide the student with a certificate in Basic First Aid.

I would like to ask for all of your help. I have two projects that I am working on for our MARC web site that I believe would not only help our own members, but also help other riders as well.

The first project is to develop a "MARC Event Checklist" for new (and maybe current??) members. At this time, I'm thinking it would focus on three key areas: (1) Pre-Event Preparations, (2) Pre-Arrival Checklist and (3) Post-Event Activities. I am hoping it will help new members of existing groups or new MARC groups as they are formed. I will take any/all ideas and publish them in the next newsletters, as well as one the web site. So please, would you help me? I've included both mail/e-mail address below.

My second project will focus on a suggestion list on what should be taken as "essentials" when taking a "motorcycle mobile" vacations. As many of you know, Hiroko and I traveled 2500+ miles during our one week outing, and there was no information that we could find on the web suggesting what we might want to have with us. Naturally, we took anything and everything we ever thought we might need, but nothing replaces experience.

But that's my whole point with both of these projects. Why does each new member have to learn from the "school of hard knocks?" Why can we share some of our many past experiences as "suggestions" or "tips" for those with less (or no) experience?

By now, I hope some of you are wondering why/how I chose the title of this article? Let me explain.

Fear of the unknown has different effects on people. But most people want to avoid fearful things because they are ... well, fearful!!

If you've ever gone swimming in the ocean or a lake, one of the very first things you begin asking before you "jump in" is ... how cold is the water?

For this trip, Hiroko and I asked ourselves, "What should we take?" For me, I think it was easier for me. I was so anxious to get on that bike and just RIDE that I probably would have gone with nothing more than a few essentials (money, driver's license, helmet, money, spare key, jacket, more money, etc. etc. etc. and of course, money!!!), but Hiroko is always the "logical" one between the two of us. She plans the days, counts to be sure we have enough socks and other stuff (that I "always" forget), and then we get on the road.







AMA NEWS & NOTES

New Jersey Assembly Bill 1061, introduced by Assemblyman Peter R. Biondi (R-District 16), provides for additional penalties for drivers involved in right-of-way accidents that result in injury or death. Revenue derived from the enhanced penalties would be dedicated to fund motorcycle safety education and awareness programs. A1061 was referred to the General Assembly Law and Public Safety Committee in January 2002.

West Virginia Senate Bill 260, introduced by Senator John R. Mitchell, Jr (D-District 8), provides for an additional penalty for right-of-way violators in which the violator is found to have caused injury to another person. SB-260 was referred to the Senate Judiciary Committee in January 2002.

WV SB-260 & NJ A1061 are consistent with the AMA's Motorcyclists Matter campaign, launched in 2001, which aims to curb right-of-way violations by increasing penalties for those who cause harm to vulnerable roadway users such as motorcyclists, bicyclists and pedestrians. Legislation based on the AMA'S model bill is pending in several other states as well.

Your support for WV SB260 & NJ A1061 is needed to make sure motorists and courts know that 'Motorcyclists Matter.'

The US Bureau of Transportation Statistics has released several new publications including; The Pocket Guide to Transportation. This is a quick reference to the changes in the U.S. Transportation System since 1970 and how they have affected the nation's economy, safety, energy use, and the environment.
