From The President's Desk::

Dinner was delicious (thanks to our hosts at the Lakeview Café) and the company was even better. I cannot forget to thank Bonnie and her elves for the centerpieces that many of our members took home. Thanks also go to Kay, (XYL of Mel, KD6MPB) for the Christmas treats that she brought for each (couple or single) MARC member at the dinner. In addition, I shall say that it was an honor to have Alan Gallagher, from the BARN Radio system, join us for Christmas dinner.

Now for your entertainment. Here is the next chapter of the continuing saga in Rialto that I started last month. The fires are past and now just a terrifying memory. We still have the residual ash being blown down from the hills by the ever present Santa Anna winds. We have had wind upwards of 50 miles per hour several days this past month. It was also sad for the two ladies who were crushed by falling buildings in Paso Robles when the earthquake hit there. Thankfully, we were spared the destruction that leveled Bam, Iran.

Our personal twist to this is the loss of our land line (twisted pair) telephone. Each time it rains, (enough to soak in twelve inches or so) our telephone goes on the fritz. Thus no e-mail either. So if I haven't responded to an urgent message or said hello to a new member, I shall say "sorry." I am making an effort to correct this recurring telephone failure. During these cooler winter months, the battery can take a serious dump. Please take a minute to check the water level (a weak battery can freeze and burst). Then put a trickle charger on for a few hours each week. A "hot" or fully charged battery will have a much easier time starting a cold motor or one that has not been ran for a few days. If you neglect your battery now, it might just be time to buy a new one next spring. Ah spring! That is a beautiful time, warm weather, trees and flowers blooming, and motorcycles out on the highways. Hang in there! Warmer weather is coming.

LISTEN UP !! ABOUT THAT CPR !!

As you probably remember I have written articles from time to time in the newsletter about the desirability and the smartness in taking a CPR class -- And in maintaining the knowledge and capability necessary for you to help save someone's life.

Those words and admonitions are just as important now as they have ever been. You still need to prepare yourself in case you are the only person on the scene of an accident, or at home, or at some isolated place -- When you are confronted with a situation where you are the only person available to administer CPR to your wife, your child, your friend, or anybody that is experiencing a breathing or respiratory problem.

NOW -- Suppose that person experiencing the problem is **YOU** -- And there is no one else around to help you. Don't you wish that some other people had taken the time to prepare themselves for such an emergency -- And that one of them was here to take care of you now.

Don't despair, all may not be lost -- There is something that **YOU** may do to help save your own life -- during a heart attack. What you do during the early moments of a heart attack can mean the difference between life and death. If you are experiencing what you think might be a heart attack -- And there is no one around to perform CPR on you - **- Do the following:**

Immediately take a deep breath and cough twice, as fast as you can. Wait a couple of seconds, take another deep breath, and cough twice more. This will contract your diaphragm, compressing your heart and causing it to pump. **It's a simple form of self CPR.**

Keep repeating this process until your heart begins to beat normally -- Or, until help arrives. Once your heart has stabilized, chew and swallow one aspirin. Then take two cayenne pepper capsules, or a tablespoon of Tabasco sauce. (Hint: these items might be worth while things to carry in your car, your shaving kit, or your motorcycle saddlebags) The aspirin will help thin your blood and prevent platelets from sticking -- While the Tabasco or cayenne will dilate your blood vessels so that the blood can flow freely.

This simple technique can dramatically increase your chances of survival.. Even if there **IS** someone around that **IS NOT** capable of administering CPR to you -- You can at least instruct them to hunt for the aspirin and Tabasco.

While your thinking about it -- why not take this opportunity to talk your spouse, child, friend, or "riding" buddy into enrolling in a CPR class -- So that they can better prepare themselves to help save some ones life in the event of a heart attack. Just keep in mind that the person's life that they might save **MIGHT BE YOURS.**

That way when she asked her husband what he wanted for dinner, she was certain to have it on hand.

MUTH SIGNAL MIRRORS INSTALLATION

I just finished installing the MUTH Signal Mirrors on my '01 GL-1800. Here are some observations and comments that may help other MARC members install these mirrors.

MUTH p/n 220-0146-0, available from "<http://www.dallasmotorcycles.com/>" – excellent customer service...!

- 1) I was very impressed with the quality and the heavy-duty construction of the mirror assemblies, particularly the adjustment mechanism. I was a little surprised that the mirror edges, while not sharp, are not covered with edging.
- 2) The mirrors themselves are slightly convex, so that you get a little "wider" look – that's good. But, they have that "Objects in the mirror are closer than they appear" message along the lower edge – sigh...! (I understand why a manufacturer has to put that wording on a convex mirror, but I still don't like it). I covered up some of the message by placing a 2" Convex Spot Mirror (Custom Accessories #71111) at the bottom of the each mirror, positioned so that it just clears the lower LED. IMO, these small add-on mirrors are lifesavers...!
- 3) The LEDs are "aimed" carefully – they are very bright when viewed from off to the side of the bike – but from the driver's seat the intensity is very subdued...!
- 4) The lower part of the rubber gasket surrounding the mirror has to be pulled away from the fairing. But, just pull the lower rear corner away from the fairing – try not to pull the lower front corner away because it is a royal pain in the A\$# to get it back in place snug against the fairing...! Pull the rubber away from the fairing just far enough to see the turn signal connector, then swivel the mirror housing forward (it's pretty stiff but it does move forward – and slightly down). It's really a tight fit inside that opening in the fairing where the OEM connector is located, but the supplied wiring harness will fit if you take your time.
- 5) I put wire loom over the longer wires of the MUTH harness (that goes into the mirror housing to connect to the LEDs) to prevent chafing of the wires on the mirror bracket. The wire insulation is excellent quality and the loom may be overkill – but its' good cheap insurance...! I connected the wiring harness to each mirror assembly and tested the LED array(s) before bolting it in place. Both mirror assemblies lighted properly.
- 6) After engaging the two mounting upper tabs into their respective slots in the housing, I carefully tried to rotate the bottom of the mirror assembly into the housing – it was hitting something and wouldn't go. Looking into the housing along the bottom of the mirror assembly, I could see that the "spring nut" was hitting the plastic mounting plate. I used a flat blade screwdriver between the metal mirror base and the plastic plate and gently "coaxed" it into place. OK, tighten the screw in and we're done with that side – ugh, something's not right...! MUTH supplies a new mounting screw with each mirror assembly, but after trying unsuccessfully for about 10 minutes to get it to engage the "spring nut" on the mirror's base, I took a close look at where it was to go and determined that the screw was really about 1/8" too short to reach properly. Damn...! I picked up the OEM screw – it was the same size – but the head of the OEM screw was slightly smaller in diameter – enough to let the head fit up into the shallow "well" of the plastic mounting plate in the mirror housing. BINGO – IMO, it is still somewhat short but it does engage the spring nut and tighten securely.
- 7) I was very pleased with the brightness of the LEDs – and the "angled-away-from-the-driver" concept is really slick...! But I was totally unprepared for how BRIGHT those LEDs are at night – IMO that small array of LEDs is brighter than the entire OEM rear turn signal. Impressive...!

I hope these comments help other Wingers with the MUTH Signal Mirror installation...!

COORDINATING AN EVENT

I was asked to write a little about coordinating an event. The MARC group has handled small bicycle events of 100 to 300 riders to the large events like Orange County's Multiple Sclerosis 150 mile, two day bike tour, with almost 1100 bicycle riders. We are asked to handle as little as covering the route looking for people needing assistance to adding additional route markers if there are missing signs to just about everything beyond that. The event organizers may only have you attend one or two of their meetings or you may ask to sit and help in the planning from the start.

I would like to start by describing what to do for a small event, it just expands from here as the event officials become more aware of what your group can do for them. The small event is an event where you may have attended a couple of those planning meetings or not. Again a small bicycle event may have 100 to 300 riders with 1 to 3 overlapping routes of something like a 25, 50 and a 100-mile routes. You would need at least 1 motorcycle to cover a 20 to 25 mile section of the route, and a net control operator (4 motorcycles minimum). The more motorcycles you have the less area each has to cover and the easier it will be on all. You as the coordinator of the motorcycle group would send one motorcycle out with the lead bicycle. This is so you can keep track of the lead rider and let the event officials know where that lead rider is when asked and net control will let the officials know so that they can prepare for his arrival at the finish line. You can keep in contact with the lead motorcycle and as he gets to the second section of the route you will send another motorcycle out. The second motorcycle will slowly ride the route until he lets you know that he has arrived at the second section of the route and you will send out the next motorcycle so on and so on. Finally you will send the last motorcycle out with the last rider to keep track of the end of the ride, again so the event officials will know where the last bicycle is and when all the riders are finished with their route. After the first motorcycle gets the first rider to the finish he will then cover the last section of the route, the second motorcycle will cover the second section from the end and so on. If you only had the 4 motorcycles you would give each of them about a 25 miles section of the 100 mile route. As the last motorcycle moves into the next section (25-50 mile section) the motorcycle assigned to cover that section can assist the sweep motorcycle and also move forward, this will allow you to decrease the amount of area that each of the motorcycle has to cover, until all bicycle riders are finished. The job of the motorcycle will be to radio to net control any problems that they come across and to help out where they can. It is best if each motorcycle could carry extra route signs and directions along with a tire patching kit and extra drinking water for the bicycle rider that came unprepared. It is also good if the event officials can arrange to have support and gear (SAG) vehicles that can pick up bicyclists that break down and can't repair their bike on the course or for those ride that just can't finish the ride.

For a larger bicycle event the advance planning will play an important role. It is important to plan out the safest route you can find. Other planning may include locating and document emergency support like hospitals and bike shops along the route. The volunteers that come to help may not be familiar with the event area and any advance help (with maps and or directions) to locate these places will only speed getting any problems taken care of in the shortest time allowing the volunteer to move on to help the next person.

Determining best locations for rest stops and the supplies (drinks & snacks) that will be needed at each location. You will want the bicycles that stop at the rest stops to move well out of the road for their safety.

If you have a lot of communicators you can place them at rest stops, in the supply truck, as shadows with the event officials so messages can be relayed between net control and the officials. It will help to have back up people to relieve the primary person at some of these positions.

For the Orange County's Multiple Sclerosis MS150 bike tour we have two radio clubs that support this event. The MARC group supplies the motorcycles that can more easily cover the routes and the CARES group whose volunteers cover the rest stops, the shadowing of the event officials and supply the HAM operator for the SAG vehicle together we supply about 40 to 50 HAM operator for this two day event. We may have up to 15 motorcycles and 10 SAG vehicle signed up to work this event. Family and friends of the MARC group come out and help fill non-motorcycle position with the CARES group as this event requires so many volunteers.

For the MS150 Saturday is the hardest day because we are covering a total of 100 miles; the riders that are fast riders can ride the full 100 mile course and the other bicyclists will ride the 50 miles route. The committee has set up a cutoff place and time that the 100 mile riders must achieve to be able to continue on the 100 mile route. If the rider makes it to the cutoff point in time he is able to continue on the 100 mile course. This cutoff point and time is mainly because, the committee wants to close both the 50 & 100 mile course before sunset. On Sunday we cover a 50 mile route, a slower easier day. Unlike other events that are a 1 day event and have shorter routes. The MS150 is a 2 day, 50 miles each day minimum, the big problem with both days is that not all the bike riders are able to ride 50 miles a day. This is where the other HAM radio group and the SAGs are most needed. The CARES group sets up their net control next to the MARC net control. When a motorcycle finds a bicycle rider that is unable to finish the route he contacts the MARC net control. MARC then passes the message to the CARES net control and in turn their net control sends a (SAG) vehicle out to pick up the tired bike rider and bring them to the finish line. The SAG vehicles are also out on the course all day long to help the riders with flats or broken bikes and sometimes just a lift up a big hill or to the next rest stop. The motorcycles can also help with flats and other things but it is best to radio for a SAG and wait with the rider until a SAG vehicle arrives to help. Then the motorcycle can get back on the road and continue to patrol his route.

Recent years we have had bicycle mobiles as tail gunners along with the motorcyclists and to assist on bike trails where motorcyclist can not travel.

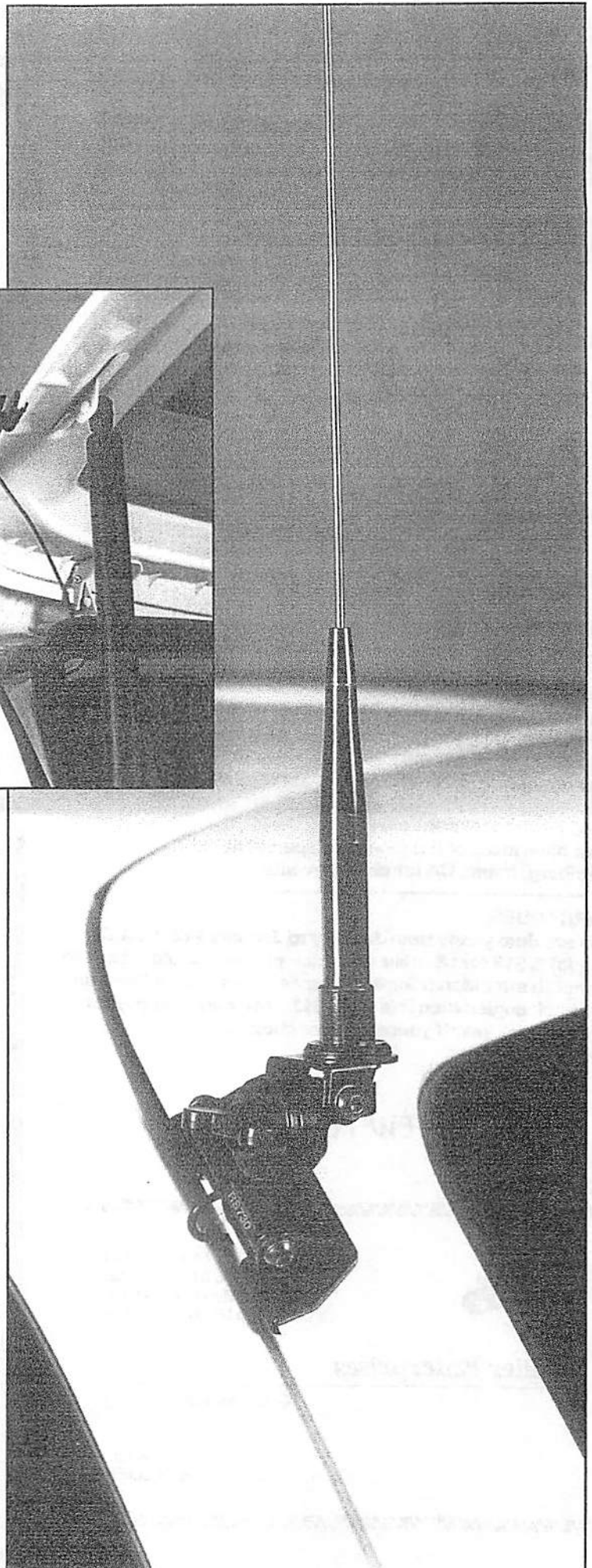

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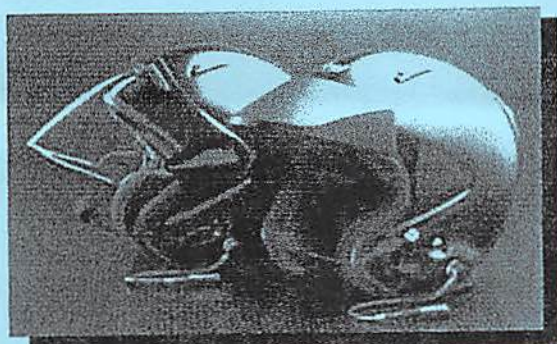
