These volunteers are doing everything from working the net control base station, the SAG's, the bicycle tail gunners, providing communications at the rest stops and supply trucks and of course the motorcycle riders. I want to thank each and everyone of our MARC family members who are giving of their precious time for this and other events. It literally brings goose bumps to my arms and tears to my eyes when I think about all the work our MARC volunteers do for these wonderful charities. Thank you, Thank you, Thank you, God Bless you all.

SCMA 3 Flags Classic, Mexicali MX to Kelowna, B.C. Canada.

A few statistics first, the total miles for the entire trip, home to home was ABOUT 3800 miles, Casper, the 8 month old white 1800 GW now has 41,000 miles on it, averaged between 35 and 37.9 mpg between gas fill ups that took on 9 to 11 gallons of gas at times. That was 2 up (Bonnie was an absolute trooper on this grueling ride), with all the rain gear, cold weather gear & lots of it, several changes of clothes, extra 5 gallon gas tank in the right saddle bag, small air pump (which we used several times) and all the other stuff we could carry in the trunk, trunk rack bag, left saddle bag and the large box at the back of the bike on the Heavy Duty Bushtec Deluxe trailer hitch. By the way, John, Bonnie and I rode the entire official route start to finish, (2064 miles) except once where we got lost and came to a dead end road and had to back track to the main highway that was part of the route for sure. Don't trust those GPS's to be right every time, all the time. The good old AAA maps and the detailed SCMA 3 Flags Classic maps handed out at the start are by far the most dependable.

John Edwards came down to our house in Irvine at about 9:50am Thursday morning Sept 2nd. We were on the road headed for El Centro CA by 10am. It was a beautiful ride down I-5 to the I-805 in San Diego. The weather was in the high 70's and stayed that way when we transferred to the I-8 East toward El Centro. The ride up through El Cajon, Alpine, Pine Valley was nice temperature wise at above 4,000 feet. When we dropped out of the Cuyamaca Rancho State Park and on to the desert floor at Ocotillo the temperature hit 113 degrees for the that last 27 miles. Bonnie has a problem with high heat and we picked up the speed a little to get her to the Motel 6 where we had reservations for the night. We got to El Centro about 1:30pm. We quickly checked in and changed into some cooler clothes and went next door to the Carl's Jr for some lunch. Drank lots of ice tea while we were killing time.

When we came out of the Carl's Jr we looked back toward the Motel 6 and could see smoke coming from the area where our motorcycles were parked so we ran back to the motel to discover an old 80's Cadillac on fire that no one was around. It was right next to our bikes so we move them away from that car and called the 911 number. They already knew about it, so a couple of long minutes later the El Centro Fire Dept showed up, laid a line and we watched them struggle getting the hood open while the fire blazed away. Finally they got out the K-12 circle saw and cut a big hole in the front of the hood to get to the latch. I loved all these happenings because I am a retired fire captain. After they got the fire out, found the owner and got the information and got their hose loaded, I got to talk to the 3 fireman on the rig. Of course the car was a total loss, the owner had just purchased it that morning from a friend. Went to bed at 8pm that night.

We got up at 2am and got ourselves ready to get across the US/Mexican border to find the Araiza Hotel, the guest hotel for the start point of the 2004 3 Flags Classic. It was a good thing we got



over the border by 3am because the maps giving directions to the Araiza Hotel were not all that good and we got lost and it took us 30 to 40 minutes of riding around Mexicali to finally find the place. The only reason we did find it when we did was because we accidentally rode past the back side of it and found our way back to it.

We got our pictures taken for the 3 Flags Classic Passports, signed our release forms and got about 20 minutes to talk to some of the many friends we have made over the years of 19 consecutive 3 Flags Classics. At exactly 4am they collected the start cards and it was a mad dash to the motorcycles and then another mad dash to the border. I was actually the first one to the actual crossing, but the border patrol officer wanted me to open the trunk and the big box on the back and while he was doing that several other motorcycles got across the border at other gates. Luckily we did not load all of our gear on the bikes, but left the stuff in the motel room so that we wouldn't have to tote all that weight around on strange streets and roads in Mexico.

So we got back across the border to the motel room and took about 20 minutes to do some chores and get everything loaded. So we were actually on the road north out of El Centro by 4:45am. By then most of the 300 motorcycles were already ahead of us. So we had a lot of company headed north up the 111 to East on State 78 to Blythe where we hit I-10 East for about 38 miles to where we picked up 60/71/89 up through Prescott AZ. We stopped in Yarnell on 89 south of Prescott to use the facilities and have breakfast. While there we got passed again by all the motorcycles we had passed on the way, that far. So we would have to pass all these same motorcycles again sometime this day. By getting out of El Centro by 5am we got out of that severe 113 degrees heat from the day before. It was about 80 degrees in the morning, but there was no sun to beat down on us.

Once we got through Prescott AZ we begin to catch up with a lot of the motorcycles again and the wind came up pretty severely. The route took us up 89 to I-40, West through Flagstaff where we stopped for the 1st gas fill up. All the way from Prescott up through Flagstaff, North on 89, all the way to Kanab UT we had severe winds, sometimes head on, sometimes from the right side, but we never got a break for about 300 miles. Finally when we turned East on UT-12 at Panguitch UT we ran out of the wind. Here we got gas and put on some of our cold weather gear because we have been over that UT-12 before up through Tropic, Escalante and Boulder to Torrey UT. We knew this would be a very cool and curvy road. Check point #1 was at the Day's Inn in Torrey. Back at the intersection of the 89/12 where we stopped to get gas and add cold weather gear, we also called ahead to the Day's Inn in Torrey to make reservations for the night. They only had 3 rooms left and we were happy to get one of them. We had come 770 miles that day to the first check point. These roads today had some really great curves, hairpin and switch backs in them, really great motorcycle roads. After Flagstaff we were at near or over 4,000 feet elevation all day.

After getting our passports stamped and signed off we unloaded the bikes and asked about a good place to eat. We went to the only place they could tell us about. It was very high priced, the waiter was very rude and the food wasn't anything to brag about. End of Day One.

Back up at 4am, 39 degrees, put on all our cold weather gear, others were already gone and others loading their motorcycles, on the road at 4:45am. Got back on UT-12 north to 72 north across I-70 onto UT-10, north to Price. Stopped for gas at Price, a highway patrolman at the station says that the winds blew there all day yesterday too, then onto 191 north. Now this section of 191 we know very well because we have been over it many times on past 3 Flags Classics. It is 45 miles of motorcycle bliss. Long sweeping curves in open range (watch out for the cattle) in a valley between 2 rolls of hills with the road at 9100 feet. You can really tear down that

road because you can see all the road ahead of you for half a mile and can straighten out all the curves. After we left 191 the route took us west on US-40 to I-80 west for a short time to I-84 north to UT-167 & UT-165 north toward Logan UT. It was while we were on 167 that the GPS guided us off onto 158 and we came to a dead end road and had to back track to 167 again. This was the area that we got light hail and rain on us. It was so light that we never bothered to put on our rain gear. This is also where we decided NOT to go by the GPS's strictly anymore and depend on the little yellow route maps that the 3 Flags Classic volunteers passed out at the start in Mexicali. After that we never got lost again using the combination of the GPS's and the little yellow maps.

We get into check point #2 at Pocatello ID about 2:40pm Saturday afternoon, we had come 1227 miles from the start on Friday morning. We didn't waste much time there. Just used the rest rooms, got the 3 Flag passports stamped and signed, got some snacks and gassed up again and hit the road north up the I-15. At Blackfoot ID we take UT-26 NE to US-93 North. UT-26 is pretty straight, but once we got on US-93 that all changed. Talk about some real motorcycle roads, this is it. Once you get to Challis ID it is a road with many, many curves, although the red lines of the road on the maps don't really show it. Right where we crossed into Montana we were right next to the Great Divide where we crossed one pass at 7,241 feet & another at 6,951 feet. It was getting late in the afternoon but we pushed on.

We passed motorcycles parked at motels in Salmon, Darby and when we got to Hamilton we tried to get a room at the Days Inn and Casino, but there were none available in town at any of the other motels either. So we had no choice other then to push on. Now it was dark and starting to cool down rapidly. About 20 miles further up the road we came to the very small town of Stevensville MT. There was a very small Arrow Inn motel there and they had 2 smoking rooms left, and that was it. We were told in Hamilton that you can't find a room in Missoula MT because the U.of MT had a home football game there that day and everything for 50 miles of Missoula was sold out. So we took a look at the 2 smoking rooms at the Arrow Inn and they did not smell to bad, so we took them and was thankful to get them too. We quickly unpacked the bikes and headed for the downtown area of Stevensville to find a place to eat that the man at the motel recommended. Before we got to the restaurant recommended by the motel clerk, we saw Mary's cafe. A very tiny hole in the wall place and decided to try that. That was a great decision because the food was so good, lots of it and the price was more than reasonable.

Up again at 4am and on the road again by 5am toward Missoula. There we filled up with gas and continued up 93 across I-90. At Ravalli MT we pick up MT-200 NW toward Sandpoint ID and check point #3. Just after we turned onto MT-200 we came to a mule deer standing in the middle of the road. She just stood there looking at us approach, so I honked the horn and she took off back the way she had come, across the ditch and over the fence. A little down the road from there we encountered a coyote standing in the road, honked the horn again and away he went. That was the closest we got to hitting any animals on the whole trip, good thing too, some of the other riders were not as lucky, we heard later.

The third checkpoint at Sandpoint ID was to open at 10am, but we got there at 9am, so went to the McDonald in the same mall and had breakfast. When we came back we saw MARC members Dean KD6HEL, John WH6BJ & Carroll KN6P waiting to get their passports stamped and signed. We had ours already done and got out of there ahead of the Magnificent Seven, IBA Riders.

From Sandpoint we took US-2 West to US-395 and then north to the Canadian border at Laurier WA. There we gassed up for the last time to be able to make it all the way up to Kelowna and back out of Canada to the USA without buying gas in Canada. Not that it made any difference, we just didn't want to use our credit cards in Canada for gas, no big deal. Once we got into Canada we changed our driving habits a lot. We took it a lot easier. From the border the official route took us West on the Trans Canadian Hwy to Hwy 33, North all the way to Kelowna. We arrived at the final destination at the Grand Okanagan Lakefront Resort in Kelowna at 2:30pm Sunday. The Magnificent Seven (IBA Riders) had caught us about 10 miles out of Kelowna and of course were waiting there when we got to the finish, so we were about 15th to the finish line, not bad riding 2 up and carrying all that cold weather gear and clothing. As always, the official route was special in that it was just a great motorcycle route and the scenery was spectacular too, and the banquet Tuesday night was as always very special. Paul and his crew had done another A+ job.

We had come 2064 miles with 6 gas stops, in a total time of 60.5 hours. All I can say is that we love this ride. Riding with our riding partner, John KC6ZQZ is in itself a treat and we work and ride together so well. There is never a disagreement or angry word spoken, even when we take a wrong turn and get lost. We actually have a big laugh over it and just think it is part of riding the 3 Flags Classic. The roads are something to see, the camaraderie is spectacular with all the participants that we have met over the many years we have ridden this ride. Bonnie was an absolute gem on this ride too. She weathered the rain, hail and hot weather without a whimper. Did I mention that Bonnie won the biggest 50/30/20 portion of the money drawing, by winning "ABOUT" \$1300, wow do we get to celebrate now. That just about paid for the whole trip for Bonnie and I, including the price of the 3 Flags Tickets.

The ride home was as short and swift as possible. We departed Kelowna at 5am on Wednesday morning Sept 8th. Made it all the way down US-97 to Weed CA, about 750 miles. They should name that section of US-97 from Kelowna to the Oregon border, the "Apple Valley Highway". For a stretch of about 300 miles we never ran out of apple orchards. Picked up I-5 at Weed and made it all the way down to Modesto/Lodi CA that night. That was a 1058 mile day. Up again at 4am and on the road before 5am to try to beat the heat coming down I-5 to Southern CA. Got home to Irvine CA at 10:30am Thursday Sept 9th. Believe it or not, we actually got sprinkled on 3 times on the I-5 between Castaic CA and home in Irvine, that was about the last 95 miles. Hey, it never rains in Southern CA in the summer time. It was a good thing that it didn't rain any harder anyplace on the whole trip, as when I got home I found my rain gear laying on the table where I had laid it so I wouldn't forget them. Getting OLDheimers disease I guess.

We are already making plans for next years 30th anniversary SCMA 3 Flags Classic for the year 2005. It will go from Tijuana MX to Calgary Albert Canada over Labor Day Weekend, a 5 day, 8 state ride. My son Rod has already said he wants to join us. He has done the 20th & 25th anniversary 3 Flags Classics. We'll have to add another auxiliary fuel cell to his 1992 GW, he already has one 4.4 gallon tank in the right saddle bag, but he will need more to keep up with us.

WOW!!! Is it time for the MS150 and the LoveRide already. Where did the past year go??? I've been told that as you get older the years fly by faster and faster. Hmm, I must be getting older. Time has come again to gas-up your bikes and test the pit button to see if it still works.

LoveRide 21 is just around the corner on November 14th and as in years past looks to be a good day for a ride, entertainment and food. This year's talent at the Castaic Lake will be Lynyrd Skynyrd and at Glendale Harley-Davidson it will be Charlie Breitels entertaining the masses.

The food this year will be provided by Rattler's BBQ of Santa Clarita. Also the Victor McLaglen Motor Corps will be performing again this year. As usual there will also be various celebrities attending this ride. I am still taking signups for this ride. **THE LAST DAY FOR SIGNING UP TO DO THE LOVE RIDE WILL BE AT THE MARC MEETING ON 10/9.**

For the new members that are working the ride or considering signing up, here is a brief description of what our job is: For the motorcycle mobile ham operators our main job is to ride along with a group of motorcycles and to report to the net control operator any adverse conditions on the road such as an accident or other problems that could cause a problem for the ride. With up to 20,000 motorcycles leaving Glendale, this information is helpful to keep the ride to Castaic Lake going smooth. If a problem is reported, the people at Glendale can slow the number of bikes leaving until conditions clear up on the road. Unlike the bicycle rides that we work we are NOT there to assist the motorcycle riders, there are way too many that are alongside the road for one reason or another for us to help.

For the people working the freeway onramp your job is to slow down the riders approaching the sharp right turn onto the freeway and to report if the backup getting onto the freeway is getting to long. In previous years before we started working the freeway onramp at least one accident occurred each year at that location and that stops the ride until the accident has been cleared up. For the past few years that we have provided people at this location there has been no accidents at this location.

We are going to meet at the McDonalds on San Fernando road and the Glendale (2) freeway at 6 am to be in place by 6:30. The frequencies will be: For net control, 447.560- PL 136.5 and for bike to bike and at Glendale, 144.370 simplex.

I will have all this information and maps at the meeting on 11/13, the day before the Love Ride so if you can, please attend. 9-1-1 Calls From A Cell Phone

When calling 9-1-1 from a cell phone, it does NOT give your location to the 9-1-1 operator.

Your call goes to the Local Highway patrol.

Make sure you tell them **WHAT CITY, ADDRESS, and your CELL PHONE NUMBER** you are calling from, as they will not have it on their screen like it does when you call on a Land Line phone.

Tell the Operator the type of problem you have in a calm voice.....I need police....I need Fire....I need Ambulance....etc...

Listen to the Operator for questions and instructions.

Stay on the phone until the operator hangs up or tells you that you can hang up.

If you do not get out this info when they first answer, precious moments are wasted. Minutes can be critical for saving a life.

Also, even if calling from a Land Line or Hard Line phone, remember that sometimes the computers are not always updated properly.

It might still show an OLD ADDRESS for your phone. Confirm all your info to the operator when you call 9-1-1, never "ASSUME" they have it.

I have responded to 9-1-1 calls and was sent to the person's old home, as the phone company never updated the address in the system when they moved, but kept the same phone number.

Gordon West WB6NOA, was present putting on a demonstration on microwave radio.


We had nice weather and good friendship all around, and was able to spread the MARC message.

That is why the AAWA is encouraging you to enter your zip code in the Take Action Now! icon, click "GO!" to write your Member of Congress, and urge them to ensure motorcycles are considered in ITS development, within the TEA-21 reauthorization process.

The National Agenda for Motorcycle Safety (NAMS) revealed that this promise has fallen short of expectations. According to the working group, the Department of Transportation's desire to accelerate the deployment of the intelligent vehicle initiative raises concerns that expanded traffic enforcement that includes reliability in a mixed traffic environment that includes motorcyclists. Moreover, the research that has been conducted since TEA-21 has focused solely on automobile safety. There has not been one study conducted on motorcycle safety. This critical because motorcycle awareness is a passive safety dilemma; whereas ITS technology enhances awareness.

The U.S. Department of Transportation has not provided a reasonable accommodation to motorcyclists as it relates to intelligent-vehicle transportation. As stated in TEA-21, motorcyclists by law must be considered in the development of intelligent-vehicle transportation systems (ITS).

The AMA is urging Congress to direct the Department of Transportation to ensure that motorcyclists are considered in design, evaluations, and assessments prior to the deployment of intelligent transportation technologies within the private and commercial fleets within the TE-A-21 reauthorization process.

The AMA is urging all motorcyclists—and those involved in any other type of recreational activity—and their Members of Congress to tell them to support S.423 and H.R. 1749, The Health Care Party for Legal Torts.

"Because of this loophole, some one who participates in motorcycling, snowmobiling, running or walking could be denied health care coverage, while someone who is injured while drinking a car would be protected," Senator Feinstein said. "It is time that Congress corrects this so that those who are abideing by the law are not denied coverage."

In 2001, the Health Care Finance Administration released the final rules that would govern the law. The rules recognize that employers cannot refuse health care coverage to an employee on the basis of their participation in a recognized recreational activity. However, the benefits can be denied for injuries sustained in connection with those recreational activities. Essentially, the regulation grants protective status to motorcyclists without any substantive benefits.

"When Congress passed (the original law) we intended to make sure someone who is motorcycling, snowmobiling, running, or walking could not be denied health-care coverage," Stickland said. "I'm pleased to be the original co-sponsor of a bill that would ensure these individuals receive the medical coverage they need in the event they are injured while doing one of these legal activities."

Strickland called it "sad" that Congress had to step in on the issue.

On August 21, 1996 an important opportunity arose when President Clinton signed the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), prohibiting employers from denying health care coverage based on a worker's pre-existing medical conditions or participation in legal activities.

As background, self-insured employers and unions have been known to deny health benefits to their motorcyclist employees and union members. These unfair measures had been adopted on the questionable advice of third party administrators in an effort to keep the cost of insurance premiums low.

"From riding Harry Davidson motorcycles to visiting the Snowmobile Hall of Fame in St. Germain, these activities are part of Wisconsin's heritage and economy," Fehmgold said. "It simply doesn't make sense to exclude those participating in these activities from health care benefits."

Collins was joined by Senator George Mitchell (D-ME) in introducing the Senate legislation. McMannis was joined by U.S. Rep. Ted Strickland (D-OH-6) in addition to 49 original co-sponsors to the House bill.

U.S. Senator Susan Collins (R-ME) introduced S. 423, "The Health Care Party for Legal Immigration Act," and Representative Scott McInnis (R-CO-3) introduced the House companion bill, H.R. 1749.

Fits under the left handlebar module and positions the button so it is right where your left thumb is naturally under the left hand grip. Fits 1500 and 1800 Gold Wings and some other Honda models. Has been adapted to some other brands and models. Black anodized or plain aluminum available. Has standard 1/2" hole for PTT button. Price \$10.00

PTT Button, Waterproof

Has large rounded surface for your thumb, so your thumb does not get tired or sore with heavy use. Black in color. Fits in 1/2" hole on PTT Button Bracket. Price \$9.00

Antenna Bracket For 1/2" Tubular Trunk Racks

Natural aluminum color only. Fits coax with SO-239 fitting only for antennas with PL-259 fittings, can not be modified to use with NMO fittings. Price \$20.00

Antenna Bracket For Kuryakyn or American Flat Rackets For The 1800 Gold Wings.

Natural aluminum color only. The brackets are flat stock, bent so that the antenna is perfectly vertical, with 2, 8-32 threaded holes, so you have to drill 2 matching holes in the rear of your flat rack. Round head stainless steel screws hide the holes. Price \$10.00

Handlebar Brackets For HT's, Cell Phones, GPS's or Just About Anything Else

We have them for both the Left or Right side handlebars. They fit the 1500 and 1800 Gold Wings and some other Honda's too. They are Black anodized and come with all mounting hardware.

Stainless Steel Trunk Rack Plates

These 2 1/2" X 3 1/2" X .62" (1/16") SS plates are used by most of the MARC Members to keep from cracking the trunk lids. We have seen many cracked and busted trunk lids before we started putting these plates under the rear legs of the trunk racks. We have never seen a cracked lid when using these SS Plates. They fit under both the tubular and flat racks on the 1500 and 1800 Gold Wings.

Price \$10 for non polished, \$15 for the polished ones that are shipped with a plastic cover to protect the finish.




