- 2. May 18th was my 77th birthday and Bonnie and I went out to the Red Lobster and I pigged out on Lobster & Shrimp and everything else that went with it. The routes the SCMA handed out to us took us North on the I-15 for 35 miles then East through Zion National Park and then we wandered through the back roads all the way up to the North Rim of the Grand Canyon. We got caught in a light rain for a couple of hours without our rain gear because someone (no mention of names here) convinced me that we would not need our rain gear that day and we left them in the hotel. - 4. On Sunday May 31st we (MARC members) did the Ship to Shore Tour de Cure in Long Beach CA which started from the Queen Mary. There were a total of 30 MARC members who volunteered & worked this event. Six members worked the MARC net control, 2 members were bicycle mobile, there were 17 motorcycle mobiles and 4 MARC SAG vehicles all working this event. You will find the report from one of the Ship to Shore Coordinators elsewhere in this newsletter. I do want to say this, this was the worst event we ever have been involved in as far as the bicycle accidents were concerned. There were approximately 800 riders and they had to cross railroad tracks in the LA/Long Beach Port area many times, but there was one crossing that was by far the worst. I treated 3 young ladies at that one crossing and I was later told that as many as 20 riders went down at that very same location. Other then that, it was a very good first time event and again and as always our MARC members performed as professionally as humanly possible. We got so many thank you's from the riders at the end and from the ADA staff many times over. Well done gang, you were all spectacular.
- 5. The next MARC event is the Saturday June 13th MARC meeting. I am sure there will be a lot of discussion and information to be handed out for the next days, Sunday June 14th BAD (Bikers Against Diabetes) Ride. Please try to attend this meeting if you have volunteered for the BAD Ride or were a volunteer for the Ship to Shore Tour de Cure Ride on Sunday May 31st. There is going to be a meeting for all Ship to Shore volunteers right after the June MARC meeting ends. The last time we did a critique after the Palm Springs event it worked out so well that we think it would be a good idea to

do a critique of the Ship to Shore event because of all the bicycle accidents that took place. Please plan to make time to attend the critique session after the June MARC meeting. I know it is a lot to ask, but we need everyones input for this event.

6. I just talked to Alan WB6T about the BARN System Repeaters and he told me that they have 2 new Motorola Radios to be installed at the Onyx Peak site that should clear up any noise on the system. We have been able to talk to Tom & Sheron in Pahrump NV going through the Mnt. Potosi Repeater site near Las Vegas NV and linked to the Onyx Repeater above Big Bear and then through the Santiago Repeater site here in Orange County.

Both of the ALERT Repeaters that we used for the Sunday May 31st Ship to Shore event worked perfectly for us when we were in a position that we could access them. Of course there were areas at the North end of the Palos Verdes Peninsula where the road was tucked up against the hills that we had no ham radio service at all. So if there was an emergency in that area everyone was told to use their cell phones to contact MARC Net Control. There were no emergencies in that area so it never became an issue.

7. On the personal side, our new room addition is practically done all except for hooking up the air conditioning unit and they can't put it into place until the concrete is all poured for the rear patio. The concrete workers have to dig the trenches for the drainage system next. It will take about 20 yards of concrete to replace all of the old patio that they used jack hammers to take out. Then there is the rain gutters to install and a new patio cover to build. In the next week or so I hope we can move my office into the new addition.

I still don't know what I am going to do this summer. This will be the first summer in over 15 years that I have not left in late May or early June and spent the whole summer on the road. The only plans I have for sure is to go to Tulsa OK for the GWRRA Wing Ding over the week of July 4th. I may also attend the Gold Wing Touring Assoc. Gold Rush in Lexington KY the 13th thru the 16 of July. I also made reservation up in Bellefontaine OH just in case they come up with something to replace what used to be Honda Homecoming for July 22nd thru the 25th. Nothing is set in concrete like it has been in past years. Bonnie is flying back to OH on June 15th for her families annual reunion and is scheduled to return home to Irvine July 1st. I may not leave at all if all the work is not done to the back yard before I leave.

Well the days now have 14 hours and 15 minutes of day light and it really is time to leave for the summer ride. So let's all have a safe summer riding season.

The 25th Anniversary Houston-Austin MS150 a Success Despite Severe Weather and Flooding

Saturday Cancelled, Sunday Better Than Ever.

Greetings MARCies World Wide,

The 25th Anniversary Houston-Austin MS150 was held April 18-19 and it was quite a weekend. Due to severe weather all Saturday activities were cancelled, the first cancellation in the ride's history. Nearly 12,000 riders were in town from every state in the Union as well as 13 other countries for this ride. Recall that 13,000 rider slots for the MS150 were taken in just over 7 hours when registration opened last year. Fund raising for the National MS Society from this event is expected to be around \$17 Million. Yep, million with an 'M'.

During the week leading up to the Tour, we were keeping a close eye on the sever thunderstorms making their way across the western US. Weather guessing is far from an exact science and the weekend forecast fluctuated from good to bad several times. Starting on Tuesday prior to the ride the Steering Committee began daily conference calls to discuss our contingency planning. Now throughout the years the Executive Committee and Steering Committee both spend considerable time planning for abnormal and emergency situations. As the problems we were facing became better defined we fine tuned how we would handle the weather issues.

Also, I had started investigating a way to get messages to the volunteers on short notice. We do almost all of the Motorcycle Marshal coordination and information by our web site donated by MARC member Damien Nelson, KE5LZP, and emails. I decided we needed a short notice communication tool and a way to get information to the team members that would not have access to their computers for the weekend. I put a poll up on the web site to see how many were set up for cell phone text messaging. Response was good and since my archaic old cellphone didn't sufficient memory to add 100 or so numbers for a text group I was going to build an email group in my computer for messages since I always have my computer with an air card with me. On Wednesday MARC member David Ellerbe, K5DGE, offered to build the list in his Blackberry and increase his cell plan to handle the messages and that's what we did. That turned out to be a great decision to have texting available to volunteers as the weekend unfolded.

The primary gathering place on Friday is the Omni Hotel in west Houston. The severe weather was all across Texas at the time and we were watching it closely. During early afternoon an intense group of thunderstorms with hail and damaging wind parked above the overnight location of LaGrange. It dumped several inches of rain in just a couple of hours and the wind destroyed several tents as well as other facilities in the Fairgrounds. The city of LaGrange closed the fairgrounds and prohibited anybody from entering since it was deeply flooded. At 4:30 p.m. NMSS Lone Star Chapter President Mark Neagli made the wise decision to cancel all activities for Saturday. The steering committee was called into session shortly in a much too small conference room at the Omni. Our first meeting was to kick some ideas around and decide what to talk about at the next meeting. We adjourned in about an hour and reconvened at 7:00 p.m. That meeting lasted nearly three hours and we had to decide whether to cancel the entire weekend, have a reduced route on Sunday, or what. I have attended a whole bunch of meetings in the last 45 years, and this is one of the most intense meetings I have ever been in.

We identified three main problems: logistics, logistics and logistics. Wow. How do we get 12,000 people and their bicycles from Houston to LaGrange. Where do we lodge the thousands that had planned to camp in company team tents in the Fairgrounds? What's the condition of the Sunday routes? Were the break points destroyed? Where do we start, since the normal start in the Fairgrounds was not available? The forecast was for good weather Sunday except for an expected headwind for the riders. We ended the meeting deciding to go forward with a normal ride on Sunday except for changing the start location from the Fairgrounds to the LaGrange town square. I don't need to list all the details here however we decided to transport those we could with busses and SAG vans and leave to rest to fend for themselves. We expected a considerable no-show rate and figured we would be lucky to have 6,000 riders.

The severe weather continued in central and east Texas throughout most of Saturday with some relief finally coming around 3:00 p.m. or so followed by clear skies. I along with some other motorcycle volunteers left the Omni in the rain around 2:00 o'clock to head for our overnight location. On the way we passed through LaGrange so I could see the new start and how to direct the motorcycles Sunday morning. Alan Fuller, the LaGrange coordinator and his team of volunteers along with the City of LaGrange had done a monumental job of moving the

start from the Fairgrounds to Town Square. Just awesome. The remainder of the afternoon/evening I spent on the phone playing "front desk" re-arranging my supply of hotel rooms among volunteers that had planned to camp in the Fairgrounds and now needed a place to stay.

Sunday was bright and clear although that pesky headwind was alive and well. That would be tough on the bicycles however since they didn't ride Saturday the riders would not be so tired. Given that a lot of bicycle riders would be driving in from Houston, Austin and other places we delayed the start on Sunday until 8:00 o'clock. We were astounded then the counting was done that an estimated 11,300 riders participated on Sunday. WOW! That is pretty close to the normal Sunday number. We were amazed.

The ride went reasonably well. There were 44 medical incidents, about 2 dozen transports and two airlifts. The second airlift was a severe head injury which occurred in a remote area among some hills in Bastrop State Park where cell phone coverage is very poor. MARC member David Ellerbe, K5DGE, was first on the scene and got the help rolling by ham radio. Ham radio and APRS played key rolls in the quick response to this accident. I was about three miles away and riding as radio operator for two excellent non-ham paramedics. We pushed it up and headed for that scene. There were bicycle medics with the injured rider however Chip and Jim were carrying first responder equipment on their bikes and applied a collar, started an IV and did other things I don't know anything about to stabilize the patient until the ambulance arrived. The ambulance transported the patient out of the forested hilly area to a near by golf course to be loaded on the helicopter.


The finish at the Texas State Capitol building was grand as it has been every year since we moved the finish to that location. All injured riders have recovered, including the sever head injury that spent about a month in the hospital.

Sunday evening about 35 members of the motorcycle team spent the night in the Austin Omni hotel. We had our annual "Motorcycle Marshal Recap Meeting" that evening in the Omni Lobby Bar. This 'meeting" is always a lot of fun and gives us an opportunity to socialize and unwind after working hard out on the Tour. Then Monday morning we meet for a relaxing breakfast and then take an all day scenic ride through the hill country as we head back toward Houston.

This year after cancellations and we had 84 motorcycles patrolling on the Tour, 62 of them hams. On the Tuesday following the MS150 I opened the Motorcycle Marshal sign up list for the 2010 MS150. In about 48 hours all 90 slots were filled with 5 extras. Ray, I hope you can make the next one.

To see how this Steering Committee and the MS Chapter Staff recovered from the Saturday cancellation and put on a magnificent ride can only be described as astounding. Talk about a can-do team. All the logistics involved in re-routing, lodging, and taking care of 12,000 riders and 4,000 volunteers was just incredible and it came off without a hitch. I am humbled and proud to be a member of this group.

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
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
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
